DOG FRIENDLY

The City would like to take this time to remind dog owners and walkers to keep all dogs on a six foot leash and pick up their waste while out and about. This helps prevent incidents with other dogs, humans, and wildlife (especially deer) while preventing pollution of our natural environment. If you do find yourself and your dog near a deer, remember to give them plenty of space and consider changing your route to avoid them all together. Deer can become aggressive around dogs as they feel threatened and mother deer are very protective of their young.

Dogs are **<u>not allowed</u>** in Lithia and North Mountain Park. Although this may seem

"When In Doubt, Find Out" Recycling Tips and Tricks

Remember when it seemed like you could toss practically anything into your recycling cart and feel *good*? Or maybe you questioned whether something belonged in your cart, but tossed it in anyway, *hoping* for the best. After all, we're human; we like to feel *good*, and we like feeling *hopeful*.

As the world wakes up to the reality of recycling struggling, it's never been more important to reexamine our habits. Interested in knowing the **Top Ten Ways to Feel Good About Your Recycling Impact**? Keep reading.

- Always check the list of what is permissible in your recycle cart, regardless of what was allowed in other places you've lived. What can go into carts often varies by region, and even city, depending on the technology available at the sorting facility where your mixed recycling ends up. Make sure you are following your local list. Don't guess. Know.
- Never try to recycle papers made for cleaning. Items like paper towels, napkins, and tissues should be composted at home, or thrown away. These products have very short fibers and have reached their end of life.
- **Shredded paper is not permissible in recycle carts**. Not even bagged shred. Shred takes flight easily, creates excessive particulates in the air, and has a hard time making it through the sorting process at facilities.
- **Items should be empty, clean, dry, and free of food residue**. Bottles and cans should be lightly rinsed. Paper should be dry.
- **Contrary to popular belief, egg cartons don't belong in recycle carts**. Just like paper towels, the fibers are short and have reached their end of life.
- No plastic bags, or soft plastic of any kind should go into your cart. These materials clog the gears of the sorting machinery and wreak havoc at facilities. Recycle your soft plastic for free at the Ashland Recycle Center on Water Street instead.
- **No lids of any kind**. Lids can be easily trapped between pieces of cardboard, contaminating that material at sorting facilities. You can recycle your <u>metal</u> lids in a separate area at the Recycle Center on Water Street. Please see an attendant for assistance.
- No Cartons (think milk, soy, soup). These containers are aseptic, designed to resist moisture, and are often composed of three *different* materials paper, metal, and plastic which makes them a big offender at our sorting facility.
- No to-go containers (also called "clam shells"). Clam shells, which often contain foods like lettuce and pastries, flatten easily and then get trapped between pieces of cardboard and paper, just like lids do.
- **No mixed materials**. For instance, a "can" a Planter's peanuts may look like a can, but it has a plastic lid, a metal bottom and a foil-lined cardboard tube. Sorting facilities have no ability to separate the materials from one another, making them nearly impossible to recycle.

All in all, if you live in Ashland or Talent and are paying close attention to the list of materials that can go into your cart, you are doing great work! For more information, see the list below, or go to

AVISTA REMINDS YOU SAFE DIGGING IS NO ACCIDENT: CALL 811 BEFORE YOU DIG



Before beginning any outdoor digging project, call 811 at least two business days before you dig. Calling 811 will get a professional locator to your site to mark the approximate location of underground utility lines. There is a two-foot tolerance zone on each side of the line, and it is required to hand dig to determine the precise location of the utility in this tolerance zone. This service is free. Remember, you may have your own utilities that require a Private Locate request at 811.

Knowing where underground utility lines are buried before you dig will help protect you from injury, prevent damages to utilities and service disruptions, and avoid potential fines and repair costs. Underground utility lines can be just about anywhere, so keeping your shovel in the shed or garage and calling 811 first is a smart move (and it's the law).

Every digging job requires a call — even small projects like planting trees and shrubs. The depth of utility lines varies and there may be multiple utility lines in a common area. Here are just a few examples of when to call:

- Installing a rural mailbox
- Putting in a fence
- Planting a tree or shrubbery
- Building a patio or deck
- Excavating a new garden area

Get Wise this Spring WaterWise and FireWise Landscaping



Spring is the perfect time to prepare your landscape for the summer watering season. It's also a great time to reduce the wildfire risk to your home. Fortunately, it's easy to accomplish both at the same time! In fact, Ashland WaterWise recently teamed up with Ashland FireWise to create a Firewise Landscaping Demonstration Garden (with a big help from Ashland Parks & Recreation). Located at Fire Station 1, this

garden follows basic principles to create a landscape that is both WaterWise and FireWise, and we would like to share some of those principles with you!

Consider completing these simple tasks in the spring before the heat of summer sets in:

- **Pruning and cleaning** Remove easily ignitable wildfire fuels like leaves and branches before they dry out and add to your fire risk. Clearing out dead debris away from trees and shrubs also allows new growth to flourish and water to reach the roots more effectively.
- **Test your irrigation** to assess if you need to replace or repair any parts of your irrigation system before the hot summer months, when plants may otherwise dry out and be ready to ignite by embers from a wildfire.
- Mulching and aerating Completing tasks such as aerating, amending soil, and adding mulch will sustain healthy soils that cycle nutrients, minimize runoff and retain water. While great for most of your landscape, keep bark mulch away from the first five feet of your home to help stop fire from carrying directly against your siding, and opt for rock or pebbles in this zone instead.
- Add a pop of color If Mr. Frost is retired for the year, this is a great time to add new plants to your landscape. It's easy to grow plants that are both WaterWise and FireWise. Check out Ashland's Firewise Plant List for plants that are both drought tolerant and have low flammability (added bonus - the list also indicates plants that are pollinator friendly!)
