

## **COVID-19 ACCOUNT PAYMENT DEFERRAL PROGRAM**

The City of Ashland is offering a payment deferral program for past due City utility accounts affected by the economic shut down resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. Please note, the City will not shut off the water or electrical services and/or will not bill late charges related to delinquent billings through June 30. After June 30, the City will not shut off the water or electrical services and/or will not bill late charges related to delinquent billings once an agreement is completed and approved.

Utility accounts with delinquent amounts owed can apply to have those delinquent charges deferred based on two payment plan options (six month or twelve month) with the submission of the City of Ashland's Account Payment Deferral Program form. Applications must be received in City Hall beginning June 1, and no later than June 30, 2020. The portion of the deferrable amount will be due and payable by the current statements due date each month.

To continue to qualify for deferment, applicants must pay the approved amount by the monthly due date or risk being removed from the program. Additionally, any account older than three months that has a deposit on file can choose that have that deposit applied immediately towards the utility account balance.

Again, this program is for citizens of Ashland affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. The City will work with each individual through an application process. Cutting grass and weeds reduces the ability for fire to start or spread quickly and decreases the fire risk in our city. Additionally, removing flammable plants and debris in proximity to a home increases the chances of that home's survival in a wildfire event.

- Within 30 feet of every structure
- In a 15 foot wide buffer strip around your property

Ashland Municipal Code section 9.04 Requires weed abatement to be performed on all lots within city limits, including noxious weeds like blackberry and thistle. Failure to abate and maintain weeds and grass by June 15th each year can result in fines for each day the violation exists, plus any abatement and staff costs.

## ASHLAND WILDFIRE PREPAREDNESS CAMPAIGN—JUNE: BE SMOKEWISE!

The third month of the City of Ashland's Wildfire Preparedness campaign focuses on preparing for wildfire smoke. View all three months of campaign information by visiting <u>ashland.or.us/wildfireprep</u>. In June, do the following so that you are ready in the event of summertime smoke:

- Determine how your current air filtration system works and what type of filters you should have on hand for summer. HEPA or MERV 13 or higher filters are recommended to remove smoke from the air in your home during smoke events.
- Consider purchasing a stand-alone air purifier to create a clean air space for a room in your home, especially if you are sensitive to smoke. These are available at most hardware stores.
- Install weather stripping if you have leaky doors or windows to reduce the amount of smoke that enters your home.
- Window air conditioning units should not be used during a smoke event, so be ready to cover and seal if needed.

## SAVE WATER WITH A SMART LANDSCAPE



Are you interested in developing a water-smart landscape for your home or property? Choosing the right plants, supporting soil health, and proper maintenance are all keys to water-smart landscapes. Consider the following suggestions to create a landscape that has curb appeal and is easy to maintain.

**Plant Smart:** When updating your landscaping, choose plant varieties that require less water, such as Waterwise, Firewise or pollinator plants or species that are native to our area. Check out the Water Wise Landscaping website for more ideas on how to create a landscape that is healthy, attractive and uses less water. www.ashlandsaveswater.org

**Soil Smart:** A healthy soil can hold more water and provide important nutrients for plants. Aerating and mulching are great ways to loosen the soil and retain nutrients in the soil. Healthier soil means that you will not have to irrigate as often.

Water Smart: Water Sense labeled Smart irrigation controllers, which act like a thermostat for your sprinkler system telling it when to turn on and off, use local weather and landscape conditions to tailor watering schedules to actual conditions on the site. You can even control your irrigation system using your smart phone. This allows watering schedules to better match plants' needs and can help reduce water waste. <u>The City of Ashland is currently offering a rebate up to \$250 for installing a WaterSense labeled smart</u> <u>irrigation controller</u>. Ashland offers several additional resources to assist you in managing your water use, including rebates for lawn replacement, free irrigation evaluations, rebates for installing efficient toilets and washing machines and free soil moisture meters, showerheads and faucet aerators. # SPRING CLEANING CAN PREVENT WATER POLLUTION!

Human activities can pollute groundwater, so it's a good idea to know the best management practices for eliminating contaminants around the home. Groundwater becomes contaminated when water percolating through the soil carries pollutants downward to the water table.
