Weatherproof Your Federal Benefit Payments

Switch from paper checks to electronic payments today before severe weather strikes. According to the National Weather Service, the United States is the most severe weather-prone country on Earth. Hurricanes, tornadoes, flooding and other natural disasters can strike without warning and force you to evacuate your home or cause disruptions in mail service.

Ensuring you get your money in the most reliable way is the reason why the U.S. Department of the Treasury is moving to all-electronic federal benefit payments. Everyone applying for federal benefits will now receive their payments electronically from day one, while anyone currently relying on paper checks must switch to electronic payments by **March**, **1**, **2013**. Winter Storm Weather

During mid to late January, the Oregon coast and the Coast range have had severe weather. The American Red Cross has provided assistance to families and communities impacted by these storms. Their preparation began early. Their sites were stocked with supplies for immediate use and shelter teams were on standby.

This winter has been a pretty mild and warm winter. These recent severe weather scares have reminded us how quickly a good situation can become a bad one. Entire communities can be immobilized in a matter of a few seconds. Here are a few key terms and tips for winter weather and severe storms:

Winter Storm Outlook- Winter Storms are possible in the next 2-5 days.

Traveler's advisory- ice and snow are expected to hinder travel

Winter storm watch- indicates severe weather conditions within the next 36-48 hours: freezing rain, sleet, heavy snow. Avoid unnecessary travel.

Winter storm warning- severe weather is or is about to occur. Take precautions immediately, stay indoors, and avoid travel.

If your power goes out during a winter storm,

try to save your body heat. Wear warm clothing and wear a hat to bed. Keep moving around to help your body stay warm. Beware of signs of hypothermia: shivering, slow and irregular pulse, numbness, glassy stare, apathy or impaired judgment, or loss of muscle control. Late stage hypothermia may include no shivering or loss of consciousness. Try to lock the heat into your home. Pick one room on the sunny side of your house and close it off to keep the heat in. Blankets can be used to insulate the windows and doors. Tune into our emergency broadcast station 1700AM, and if you are able to use heat sources, use them carefully.

Ground Hog Day

Groundhog Day is a holiday celebrated on the second of February; however, not very many people know the history and significance of Groundhog Day. During the early morning of February 2nd, when the famous groundhog, Punxsutawney Phil, emerges from his den, thousands of spectators wait to see what happens. If Phil sees his shadow, he will return to his cozy den to hibernate for six weeks, suggesting another six long weeks of winter. If, on this morning, Phil does not see his shadow, he interprets it as an early sign of spring and will remain outdoors.

According to folklore, this holiday began as a Pennsylvania German

custom in the 18th and 19th centuries. The original origins are said to stem back even further and reside in Europe with the European Hedgehog. The German settlers in Pennsylvania chose the groundhog because it resembled the hedgehog and because they thought it was the most intelligent and sensible animal to carry on this tradition.

On February 2nd, whether or not Punxsutawney Phil sees his shadow, we should be prepared to endure another six weeks of winter. This past winter has been a mild one, and we should not become complacent. Winter storms, heavy rain fall, and strong winds are common during winter

months.

Groundhogs may or may not have the ability to predict the weather, but they are a fun furry alternate to the weatherman we see every day!
