

It's Swarm Season for Honeybees - Help Them Find New Homes

It is a privilege to witness swarming honeybees. Every spring, this wondrous event happens many times, as a growing beehive divides and sends half of its colony with the old queen to seek a new home. Before leaving the hive, worker bees fill their honey stomachs for the journey. With their full abdomens, swarming bees are unlikely to sting - their focus is on finding a new home and protecting their queen.

Unprotected, a bee swarm is exposed to rain, cold, and predators and may not survive more than three days. Even if scouts do find a location for the new hive, survival rates can be quite low.

Beekeepers dream of catching swarms. If you see a swarm or a colony that needs a new home, please report it immediately by calling one of the numbers listed below. You will be helping to sustain one of the world's most fascinating and beneficial creatures.

Recycling in Ashland

Do you watch or read Medford-based news? If so, you might be confused about the state of recycling in Ashland.

Thanks to a unanimous vote by City Council, Ashland residents will continue to have the broadest range of recycling choices in Southern Oregon. However, it's never been a better time to double-check Recology Ashland's list of what can be recycled. Is it possible that you aren't aware that certain items - especially certain *plastic* items - can't go in your recycle bin? This is a great time to find out what can (and can't) be recycled.

"Wishful Recycler" is a term for a person who loves recycling so much that they put almost anything, including plastic bags, garden hoses, Styrofoam, toys, and even wood in their recycling cart *hoping* it can be turned into something new. Wishful recycling compromises the whole industry, and wreaks havoc in sorting facilities. Are you a wishful recycler, or do you know someone who is?

Ashland Canal Piping Project

As you know, water is one of Ashland's most precious resources, and the City of Ashland takes its responsibility as a steward of our region's water and watersheds very seriously. This includes improving water quality and conserving water quantity within the Ashland (TID) Canal and Ashland Creek, the outlet of the Ashland Canal

Through this stewardship, the City's 2012 Water Master Plan identified piping the City's portion of the Ashland Canal as a priority. The project goal is to replace the open-channel irrigation canal between Starlite Place and Terrace Street with below ground pipe(s) by the year 2020.

The Ashland Canal is a regular source of seasonal irrigation water for the City. In years when water supplies are limited, the canal water is used as a supplemental water source that is treated to drinking water standards at our Water Treatment Plant. Water in an open canal is vulnerable to contaminants from a variety of sources, which increases treatment costs and reduces water

quality in Ashland Creek. Additionally, an estimated 30 percent of the canal water is lost due to seepage and evaporation.

We understand that you may have questions about the piping project. City staff and our partners have thoughtfully considered the impact this project may have on members of the community. We will do our best to minimize disruptions to the community from project design through construction.

The City's project team invites you to a Community meeting on Wednesday, April 18, from 5:00 - 7:00 p.m. in the Stevenson Union Arena (second floor) at Southern Oregon University. Meet the team, express your concerns, get answers to your questions and learn more about the piping project.

HeartSaver First Aid / CPR / AED is a classroom, video-based, instructor-led course that teaches students critical skills needed to respond to and manage a first aid, choking or sudden cardiac arrest emergency in the first few minutes until emergency medical services (EMS) arrives. Students learn skills such as how to treat bleeding, sprains, broken bones, shock and other first aid emergencies. This course also teaches adult CPR and AED use.

Simple Steps to Big Savings

The average American household wastes more than 10,000 gallons (74,800 cubic ft.) each year from easy-tofix water leaks. Across the country, these household leaks can add up to more than 1 trillion gallons of water lost every year. Be for water and start saving today with three simple steps: Check. Twist. Replace.

1. Check

First, *check* your home for leaks. An easy way to start is to examine your winter water use. Walk around your home with eyes and ears open to find leaks, and don't forget to check pipes and outdoor spigots. You can check your toilet for leaks by putting a dye tab in your toilet's tank. Wait ten minutes and if any color appears in the bowl during that time, your toilet has a leak.

2. Twist

Apply pipe tape to be sure plumbing fixture connections are sealed tight and give leaking faucets and showerheads a firm twist with a wrench. If you can't stop those drops yourself, contact your favorite plumbing professional.

3. Replace

If you can't nip that drip, it may be time to replace the fixture. Look for WaterSense labeled models, which use at least 20% less water. The City of Ashland is giving out low flow aerators and showerheads to all Ashland residents. A family of four could reduce their indoor water use by up to 60% when replacing old toilets, showerheads, bathroom aerators and washing machines.
