## Campfire and outdoor fire safety

Each summer when conditions for fire hazard exist the state will declare fire season to go into effect. When FIRE SEASON goes into effect, some activities in the great outdoors are prone to starting wildfires. In an effort to prevent these fires from starting, the Oregon Department of Forestry and other State and federal agencies impose restrictions pertaining to public and work-related activities regarding fire and, therefore is not allowed in specific areas.

Sky lanterns are prohibited yearround throughout the state. The use of exploding targets and tracer ammunition is prohibited during fire season. Backyard debris burning is prohibited during fire season.



Southern Oregon is currently under HIGH Fire Danger Level (yellow).

The fire restrictions in the City of Ashland closely mimic those of Oregon Department of Forestry. Restrictions you should be aware of include:

Chain saws may not be used between 10:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. during high fire danger. During hours outside of this time frame, chain saws may be used but require that the operator have one shovel and one 8-oz or larger fire extinguisher at the work site. A fire watch is also required for one hour after each chainsaw use:

Cutting, grinding and welding of metal is not allowed between 10:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. during high fire danger. These activities will be allowed during hours outside of this time frame only if the work site is cleared of potentially flammable vegetation and other materials, and a water supply is at the job site;

The mowing of dead or dried grass with power-driven equipment is not allowed between 10:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. during high fire danger. This restriction does not include mowing of green lawns, or equipment used for the commercial culture and harvest of agricultural crops;

Motorized vehicles, including motorcycles and all-terrain vehicles, will be allowed only on improved roads free of flammable vegetation. One shovel and one gallon of water, or one 2.5 pound or larger fire extinguisher, is required while traveling.

Any other spark-emitting internal combustion engine use not specifically

mentioned is not allowed between 10:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. during high fire danger. Use of any sparkemitting internal combustion engine is allowed outside of this time frame only if the work site is cleared of potentially flammable vegetation and other materials, and a water supply is at the job site;

Any electric fence controllers must be approved by a nationally recognized testing laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories Inc., or be certified by the Department of Consumer and Business Services, and be installed and used in compliance with the fence controller's instructions for fire safe operation.

No debris burning, including piles and debris burned in burn barrels;

No fireworks on or within 1/8 of a mile of forestlands;

Exploding targets and tracer ammunition, or any bullet with a pyrotechnic charge in its base, are prohibited;

Smoking while traveling will only be allowed in enclosed vehicles on improved roads, in boats on the water and other specifically designated locations;

Open fires are prohibited, which includes campfires, charcoal fires, cooking fires and warming fires, except at locations deemed a designated campground. Portable cooking stoves using liquefied or bottled fuels are still allowed.

### Pets and outdoor air quality

Jackson County Public Health warns pets can suffer from poor air quality too and provides some tips.

As irritating as smoke can be to people, it can cause health problems for animals as well. Smoke from wild-fires and other large blazes affects pets, horses, live-stock and wildlife. If you can see or feel the effects of smoke yourself, you also should take precautions to keep your animals – both pets and livestock – safe.

Both dogs and cats are at risk of respiratory issues, and doctors say certain animals are at heightened risk, especially puppies and older dogs, pets with asthma and bronchitis, and dogs with rounder faces and shorter noses (like bulldogs and Boston terriers).

Here are some tips to keep your pets safe:

- G Keep pets indoors with the windows closed
- G Use air conditioning to further filter the air, if possible
- G Outdoor bathroom breaks should be kept short
- G Avoid prolonged exercise
- G Keep pets well hydrated

Owners should seek immediate veterinary care for their pets if they show any of symptoms. Signs of respiratory stress include:

- G Difficulty breathing
- G Unusual or excessive coughing, sneezing, vomiting or loss of appetite
- G Swelling or inflammation of the mouth, eyes, skin or upper airway
- G Open-mouthed breathing, especially in cats
- G Weakness/lethargy
- G Uncoordinated walking/unable to stand
- G Increased salivation

HeartSaver CPR is a classroom, video-based, instructor led course that teaches adult, child, and infant CPR and AED use, as well as how to relieve choking for an adult. This course teaches skills with American Heart Association's research-proven Practice-While-Watching technique, which allows instructors to observe the students, provide feedback and guide the students' learning of knowledge and skills.

This course is for anyone with limited or no medical training seeking a course completion card in CPR and AED use to meet job, regulatory, and/or other requirements.

\*Upon successful completion, students will receive an American Heart Association HeartSaver CPR / AED Course Completion Card that is valid for two years.
