# **Ready Neighbor News**

## Winter Weather Ready

Whether traveling locally or afar this holiday season be sure to take time to give your vehicle the TLC is requires to get you to and fro. Not only does precautionary checks and maintenance make you safer it makes everyone safer as well. Regular maintenance also ensures the longevity of your vehicle.

<u>Battery and Charging System</u> – Have the battery and charging system tested by a trained technician. A fully charged battery in good condition is required to start an engine in cold weather.

<u>Battery Cables and Terminals</u> – Make sure the battery terminals and cable ends are free from corrosion and the connections are tight.

<u>Drive Belts</u> – Inspect the underside of accessory drive belts for cracks or fraying. Many newer multi-rib "serpentine" belts are made of materials that do not show obvious signs of wear; replace these belts at 60,000-mile intervals.

<u>Engine Hoses</u> – Even in cold weather your engine can overheat. Inspect cooling system hoses for leaks, cracks or loose clamps. Also, squeeze the hoses and replace any that are brittle or excessively spongy feeling.

<u>Tire Type and Tread</u> – To ensure good traction all winter long, it's best to install winter tires on all four wheels. Replace any tire that has less



than 3/32-inches of tread. Uneven tire wear can indicate alignment, wheel balance or suspension problems that must be addressed to prevent further tire damage.

<u>Tire Pressure</u> – Check tire inflation pressure on all four tires and the spare more frequently in fall and winter. As the average temperature drops, so will tire pressures – typically by one PSI for every 10 degrees Fahrenheit. The proper tire pressure levels can be found in the owner's manual or on a sticker typically located on the driver's side door jamb.

<u>Air Filter</u> – Check the engine air filter by holding it up to a 60-watt light bulb. If light can be seen through much of the filter, it is still clean enough to work effectively. However, if light is blocked by most of the filter, replace it.

<u>Coolant Levels</u> – Check the coolant level in the overflow tank when the engine is cold. If the level is low, add a 50/50 solution of coolant and water to maintain the necessary antifreeze capability. Test the antifreeze protection level annually with an inexpensive tester available at any auto parts store.

<u>Lights</u> – Check the operation of all headlights, taillights, brake lights, turn signals, emergency flashers and back-up lights. Replace any burnt out bulbs and consider replacing excessively scratched or cloudy headlights to improve visibility.

<u>Wiper Blades</u> – The blades should completely clear the glass with each swipe. Replace any blade that leaves streaks or misses spots. In higher elevations that experience more consistent snowfall, consider installing winter wiper blades that wrap the blade frame in a rubber boot to reduce ice and snow buildup between the blade and glass.

<u>Washer Fluid</u> – Fill the windshield washer fluid reservoir with a winter cleaning solution that has antifreeze components to prevent it from freezing. Do not add antifreeze to standard washer fluid. The oily consistency will smear your windshield and restrict visibility. Antifreeze also contains chemical compounds that can damage paint and some metal surfaces.

<u>Brakes</u> – If there is any indication of a brake problem, have the system inspected by a certified technician to ensure all components are in good working order.

<u>Transmission</u>, Brake and Power Steering Fluids – Check all fluids to ensure they are at or above the minimum safe levels. Fill fluids as needed.

Emergency Road Kit – Carry an emergency kit equipped for winter weather.

## Tires and Tire Traction

While the inner mechanisms of your vehicle play a critical role in safety the outer mechanisms are quite critical as well. A good all-season or winter specific tire is recommended during winter months. Additionally, in Oregon studded tires are permitted between November 1 and March 31 officially making today studded tire season. Studded tires greatly improve traction specifically on packed snow and icy surfaces. Typically, the time to install winter-weather tires otherwise is when the outside temperature dips consistently below 45 degrees because non-winter tires best performance is between 50-90 degrees meaning they have lowered performance at 45 degrees and pose a risk factor. Even if you consistently drive safely and considerate the outside conditions can be unruly and hazardous regardless. Talk to your local tire specialist today to learn more.

It is also a good idea to check road conditions prior to traveling. The Oregon Department of Transportation operates Trip Check, an online webpage with up-to-date conditions throughout the state including outside temperature and road surface temperatures, road cameras for visual interpretation, road closure information including detours and related info, and more. Most states operate a Travel Information Hotline by dialing 5-1-1. If using this feature it is necessary to pull off the road as you will need your hands to navigate the service menu.

In Oregon it is necessary in many parts of the state to carry traction devices such as chains when traveling if vehicles do not have studded tires installed. Be sure to know before you go to avoid a traffic infraction or accident.



# Winter Vehicle Supplies

You should consider carrying the following items in your vehicle daily this winter season:

Mobile phone with a charger or power storage device. Important phone numbers hand-written, including personal emergency contacts, family members and emergency services.

Drinking water or electrolyte-replenishing sports drinks (these have a slightly lower freezing temperature). First aid kit, including extra doses of whatever medications are needed by you, your family members or traveling pets. Non-perishable snacks for both human and pet passengers.

Bag of abrasive material (sand, salt, cat litter) or traction mats.

Snow shovel.

Blankets or sleeping bag.

Additional pieces of warm clothing (gloves, hats, scarves).

Flashlight with extra batteries. Extra window washer fluid.

Ice scraper with brush.

Some rags or roll of paper towels.

Jumper cables, cleaned and recently checked.

Warning devices (flares or reflective hazard signs).

Basic household toolkit (screwdrivers, pliers, adjustable wrench, small hammer, electrical or duct tape).
